Meal gap refers to the number of meals missing from the homes of families and individuals that result from insufficient household resources to purchase food on their own.

Supply data includes meals distributed through Central Texas Food Bank's direct food distribution programs or through CTFB's network of community partners.


Remaining gap refers to meal gap minus supply of food. We approximate the specific geographic spread of neighbors receiving meals from each distribution site.

Food insecurity rates were calculated using Texas-specific data from the 2019-2021 Current Population Survey (CPS), 2017-2021 American Community Survey (ACS), and the 2021 Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) data.
